Sydney Nelson (1800-1862) was born in London, England. He demonstrated musical ability when he was young and was adopted by a gentleman who gave him a good general and musical education. He studied under Sir George Smart, and became a teacher in London. He was a music retailer with lyricist Charles Jeffreys and was elected an associate of the Philharmonic Society. He became a music publisher, but, arranged musical and dramatic entertainment with members of his family, and went on tour in North America, Canada, and Australia. He died in London. He composed an opera, several burletta, many duets, trios, pianoforte pieces, and songs. He was a prolific composer, and wrote about eight hundred pieces.

Samuel Merrill Bixby (1833-1912) was born in Haverhill, New Hampshire. His company manufactured of shoe blackings and shoe dressings, but music was his passion. He was a Sunday school superintendent, choir leader, arranger and composer. He published a number of volumes of hymns and amateur song books. He died in Fordham, New York.
