This tune first appeared in *The Waterhouse Manuscript*, for three voices Treble-Tenor-Bass, ascribed to "L. B". It was first published in Stone and Wood's *The Columbian Harmony* for four voices, then in the 1804 compilation, *The Psalm-Singer's Assistant*, compiled by Solomon Howe.
