## GENERAL PRINCIPLES.

THE purpose of this Psalter is to secure the proper emphasis and rhythm of the words by the simplest means.

The success of the method depends upon the intelligence and thought of the singers rather than on a multiplicity of signs.

Psalms should frequently be read through by the singers in order to secure unanimity in rhythm, before the music is added.

## RULES.

- 1. Every word must be pronounced clearly and with natural emphasis, as in deliberate reading.
- 2. The length and accentuation of each note (or chord) in the chant must be governed entirely by the words, and not vice versâ.
- 3. The final syllable "-ed" should only be pronounced separately where this is indicated by means of a hyphen. The one exception is the word "blessed," which is always to be pronounced as two syllables.
  - Breath is to be taken at commas.

## SIGNS USED IN POINTING.

- 1. The "bar-mark". This corresponds with the bar-lines in the chant, and indicates which syllables are to be sung to each note (or chord).
- (a.) Where there is one syllable in a bar, two notes of the chant are sung to it, and generally speaking they should be sung quickly, the main emphasis being on the first note. (See Venite vs. 3a, etc.)
- (b.) Where there are two syllables in a bar, they are allotted to the two notes. (See Venite vss. 1b, etc.)
- (c.) Where there are three or more syllables in a bar, the *first* note (or chord) is repeated as many times as necessary, the *last* syllable only being sung to the second note (or chord). (See Venite vss. 1a, 2a, 3b, etc.) This is the general rule; in exceptional cases the syllables to be sung to the first note (or chord) are divided from those to be sung to the second note (or chord) by an inverted dot. (See Venite vss. 4a, 11a.)
- (d.) Where there is a dotted note followed by a crotchet in the recitation, the crotchet will be sung to the last syllable before the "bar-mark"; but if this syllable bears a verbal stress the principal note must be sung to it as well, the crotchet being sung very lightly, or even omitted altogether.

Where crotchets occur in other parts of the chant they are grouped with the

minims of which they are subdivisions, and the group is subject to the same rules as apply to the plain chords: where such groups occur on unaccented syllables they must, of course, be sung lightly and quickly.

- 2. The "single-phrase" sign \*. Normally, the colon dividing the verse corresponds with the double bar in the chant, but sometimes a far smoother effect is obtained if the whole chant is treated as a single phrase of seven bars, instead of two phrases of three and four bars respectively. In such cases, the break at the double bar is cancelled, and the whole verse is sung straight through. The verses where such special treatment is recommended are given in full at the foot of the page: but the notation must only be regarded as approximate, and anything like "strict time" is to be avoided here, as elsewhere.
- 3. The "half-chant" sign,  $\frac{1}{2}$ . This is employed in a few cases only (e.g. Psalm xv. vs. 7). In these cases the chant is commenced at the double bar. This device is only practicable with single chants.
- 4. The grouping of the verses follows that in the Prayer Book in all the psalms except Ps. xviii. vs. 1, lxxxix. vs. 50, and civ. vs. 35, where a simple sub-division obviously improves the sense.

In all the above cases of special treatment an alternative is provided in a footnote, for use if preferred.

- 5. The usual grouping of verses in certain of the Canticles (especially the Te Deum) has been modified in order to make them suitable to ordinary chants.
- 6. Three Psalms (ci., cxv. and cxlviii.) are provided with special chants having short endings, in order to secure greater smoothness. But as an alternative they are also given with ordinary chants and normal pointing.

## THE CHANTS.

- 1. The collection contains practically no new chants; the choice has been confined to those that have proved their suitability by long use.
- 2. In the few cases where chants with a reciting note higher than C have been included, an alternative chant is given.
- 3. In a few special cases "descants" are given, but the use of these is entirely optional.
- 4. As no collection can include all the chants that individual users may wish for, blank pages have been included where additional chants may be added.

Royalties arising from the sale of *The Parish Psalter* and *The St. Nicolas Chant Book* are vested in the School of English Church Music.





#### DAY 1. MORNING PRAYER.

PSALM 1. Beatus vir, qui non abiit, etc.



- BLESSED is the man, that hath not walked in the counsel of the ungodly, nor stood in the 'way of 'sinners: and hath not 'sat in the 'seat of the 'scornful.
- 2 But his delight is in the 'law of the 'Lord: and in his law will he exercise him'self' day and 'night.
- 3 And he shall be like a tree planted by the water'side: that will bring forth his fruit in 'due' season.
- 4 His leaf also'shall not'wither: and look, whatsoever he'doeth 'it shall' prosper.
- 5 As for the ungodly, it is not'so with' them: but they are like the chaff, which the wind scattereth a'way from the' face of the' earth.
- 6 Therefore the ungodly shall not be able to 'stand in the 'judgement: neither the sinners in the congregation' of the 'righteous.
- 7 But the Lord knoweth the 'way of the 'righteous: and the 'way of the un'godly shall 'perish.

PSALM 2. Quare fremuerunt gentes?



- Why do the heathen so furiously rage to gether: and why do the people i'magine a' vain' thing?
- 2 The kings of the earth stand up, and the rulers take 'counsel to-'gether: against the 'Lord and a'gainst his A'nointed.
- 3 Let us break their bonds a'sunder: and cast a'way their cords from us.



- 4 He that dwelleth in heaven shall 'laugh them to 'scorn: the Lord shall 'have them 'in de'rision.
- 5 Then shall he speak unto them 'in his 'wrath: and vex them 'in his 'sore dis'pleasure.
- 6 Yet have I'set my'King: upon my'holy'hill of'Sion.
- 7 I will preach the law, whereof the Lord hath 'said unto 'me: Thou art my Son, this day have 'I be'gotten' thee.
- 8 Desire of me, and I shall give thee the heathen for 'thine in'heritance: and the utmost parts of the 'earth for' thy pos'session.
- 9 Thou shalt bruise them with a 'rod of 'iron: and break them in pieces' like a 'potter's 'vessel.
- 10 Be wise now therefore 'O ye' kings: be learned, ye that are 'judges' of the 'earth.
- 11 Serve the 'Lord in' fear: and re'joice unto 'him with' reverence.
- 12 Kiss the Son lest he be angry, and so ye perish from the 'right 'way: if his wrath be kindled (yea but a little), blessed are all they that 'put their' trust in 'him.

PSALM 3. Domine, quid multiplicati?



- p Lord, how are they in'creased that' trouble me: many are' they that 'rise a'gainst me.
  - 2 Many one there be that 'say of my 'soul: There is no help 'for him 'in his' God.

- 3 But thou O Lord art'my de'fender: thou art my worship, and the 'lifter'up of my'head.
- 4 I did call upon the Lord' with my'voice: and he heard me'out of his 'holy' hill.
- 5 I laid me down and slept, and rose'up a'gain: for the 'Lord sus'tain-ed'me.
- 6 I will not be afraid for ten'thousands of the people: that have set themselves a gainst me'round a bout.
- f 7 Up Lord and help me'O my'God: for thou smitest all mine enemies upon the cheek-bone, thou hast broken the teeth of the un'godly.
  - 8 Salvation belongeth 'unto the 'Lord: and thy blessing 'is up'on thy 'people.

## PSALM 4. Cum invocarem.



- HEAR me when I call O'God of my'righteousness: thou hast set me at liberty when I was in trouble, have mercy upon me and'hearken 'unto my'prayer.
- 2 O ye sons of men, how long will ye blas'pheme mine' honour: and have such pleasure in vanity and' seek' after 'leasing?
- 3 Know this also, that the Lord hath chosen to himself the 'man that is 'godly: when I call upon the 'Lord' he will' hear me.
- 4 Stand in 'awe and 'sin not: commune with your own heart, and in your 'chamber' and be 'still.
- 5 Offer the 'sacrifice of 'righteousness: and 'put your 'trust in the 'Lord.
- 6 There be'many that'say: Who will'shew us'any'good?
- 7 Lord' lift thou' up . the light of thy counte'nance up'on us.
- 8 Thou hast put gladness' in my' heart: since the time that their corn and' wine and' oil in'creased.

2nd 9 I will lay me down in peace and 'take my'rest: for it is thou Lord only that 'makest me' dwell in 'safety.

PSALM 5. Verba mea auribus.



PONDER my'words O'Lord: con'sider my' medi'tation.

- 2 O hearken thou unto the voice of my calling, my 'King and my 'God: for unto' thee will I' make my 'prayer.
- 3 My voice shalt thou hear be'times O'Lord: early in the morning will I direct my prayer unto thee' and will'look' up.
- 4 For thou art the God that hast no'pleasure in'wickedness: neither shall any'evil'dwell with'thee.
- 5 Such as be foolish shall not'stand in thy'sight: for thou'hatest all 'them that work' vanity.
- 6 Thou shalt destroy' them that speak' leasing: the Lord will abhor both the bloodthirsty' and de'ceitful' man.

## 2nd Part

- 7 But as for me I will come into thine house, even upon the multitude of 'thy' mercy: and in thy fear will I worship' toward thy' holy 'temple.
- 8 Lead me O Lord in thy righteousness, be'cause of mine' enemies : make thy way' plain be'fore my' face.
- 9 For there is no faithfulness' in his' mouth: their inward' parts are 'very' wickedness.
- 10 Their throat is an 'open' sepulchre: they 'flatter' with their' tongue.
- 11 Destroy thou them O God, let them perish through their own i'magi'nations: cast them out in the multitude of their ungodliness, for 'they have re'belled a'gainst thee.
- 12 And let all them that put their trust in 'thee re'joice: they shall ever be giving of thanks because thou defendest them, they that love thy Name' shall be' joyful in 'thee;
- 13 For thou Lord wilt give thy blessing ' unto the 'righteous: and with thy favourable kindness wilt thou de'fend him' as with a 'shield.

#### DAY 1. EVENING PRAYER.

PSALM 6. Domine, ne in furore.



- p O Lord rebuke me not in thine 'indig'nation: neither 'chasten me in 'thy dis'pleasure.
  - 2 Have mercy upon me O Lord for 'I am' weak: O Lord heal me 'for my' bones are' vexed.
  - 3 My soul also is 'sore' troubled: but' Lord how' long wilt thou 'punish me?
  - 4 Turn thee O Lord and de'liver my' soul: O save me' for thy' mercy's 'sake.
  - 5 For in death' no man re'membereth thee: and who will' give thee 'thanks in the' pit?
  - 6 I am weary of my groaning, every night' wash I my'bed: and 'water my'couch with my'tears.
  - 7 My beauty is gone for 'very' trouble: and worn away be'cause of 'all mine' enemies.



- f 8 Away from me all'ye that work' vanity: for the Lord hath 'heard the' voice of my' weeping.
  - 9 The Lord hath'heard my pe'tition: the'Lord will re'ceive my 'prayer.
  - 10 All mine enemies shall be confounded and 'sore' vexed: they shall be turned back and 'put to 'shame' suddenly.

## PSALM 7. Domine, Deus meus.



- O Lord my God, in thee have I'put my'trust: save me from all them that persecute me' and de'liver' me;
  - 2 Lest he devour my soul like a lion and 'tear it in 'pieces: while 'there is 'none to 'help.
  - 3 O Lord my God if I have done 'any such 'thing: or if there be any 'wickedness' in my 'hands;
  - 4 If I have rewarded evil unto him that dealt' friendly' with me: yea I have delivered him that with'out any' cause is mine' enemy;
  - 5 Then let mine enemy persecute my'soul and'take me: yea let him tread my life down upon the earth, and lay mine'honour'in the 'dust.
  - 6 Stand up O Lord in thy wrath and lift up thyself, because of the indignation of mine enemies: arise up for me in the judgement that thou hast commanded.
  - 7 And so shall the congregation of the people 'come a'bout thee: for their sakes therefore lift' up thy'self a'gain.
  - 8 The Lord shall judge the people, give sentence with 'me O'Lord: according to my righteousness, and according to the 'innocency 'that is' in me.
  - 9 O let the wickedness of the ungodly 'come to an 'end: but 'guide 'thou the' just.
  - 10 For the 'righteous' God: trieth the 'very 'hearts and 'reins.
  - f 11 My help'cometh of'God: who preserveth'them that are'true of 'heart.
    - 12 God is a righteous Judge'strong and' patient: and God is pro'vok-ed' every'day.
    - 13 If a man will not turn he will'whet his'sword: he hath bent his 'bow and' made it' ready.

- 14 He hath prepared for him the 'instruments of 'death: he ordaineth his 'arrows a'gainst the 'persecutors.
- 15 Behold he' travaileth with' mischief: he hath conceived sorrow and 'brought' forth un'godliness.
- 16 He hath graven and dig-ged'up a'pit: and is fallen himself into the destruction'that he'made for'other.
- 17 For his travail shall come upon his 'own 'head: and his wickedness shall 'fall on his 'own 'pate.
- 18 I will give thanks unto the Lord, ac'cording to his' righteousness: and I will praise the' Name of the' Lord most' High.



PSALM 8. Domine, Dominus noster.

- O Lord our Governor, how excellent is thy Name in 'all the' world: thou that hast set thy 'glory a'bove the 'heavens!
- 2 Out of the mouth of very babes and sucklings hast thou ordained strength, be'cause of thine' enemies: that thou mightest still the 'enemy' and the a'venger.
- 3 For I will consider thy heavens, even the 'works of thy 'fingers: the moon and the stars' which thou 'hast or'dained.
- 4 What is man, that thou art'mindful of'him: and the son of man, that'thou'visitest'him?
- 5 Thou madest him lower'than the 'angels: to'crown him with 'glory and' worship.
- 6 Thou makest him to have dominion of the 'works of thy 'hands: and thou hast put all things in sub'jection 'under his' feet;
- 7 All'sheep and'oxen: yea and the'beasts' of the 'field;
- 8 The fowls of the air and the 'fishes' of the 'sea: and whatsoever walketh' through the 'paths of the 'seas.
- 9 O'Lord our'Governor: how excellent is thy 'Name in'all the 'world!

### DAY 2. MORNING PRAYER.

PSALM 9. Confitebor tibi.



- I WILL give thanks unto thee O Lord with my'whole'heart: I will speak of 'all thy' marvellous' works.
- 2 I will be glad and re'joice in' thee : yea my songs will I make of thy 'Name O' thou most' Highest.
- 3 While mine enemies are 'driven' back: they shall fall and 'perish 'at thy 'presence.
- 4 For thou hast maintained my 'right and my 'cause: thou art set in the 'throne that 'judgest' right.
- 5 Thou hast rebuked the heathen, and de'stroyed the un'godly: thou hast put out their 'name for 'ever and 'ever.
- 6 O thou enemy, destructions are come to a per'petual' end: even as the cities which thou hast destroyed, their me'morial is' perish-ed' with them.
- 7 But the Lord shall en'dure for 'ever: he hath also pre'pared his 'seat for 'judgement.
- 8 For he shall judge the 'world in 'righteousness: and minister true 'judgement' unto the 'people.
- 9 The Lord also will be a defence ' for the op'pressed: even a refuge in ' due ' time of ' trouble.
- 10 And they that know thy Name will put their 'trust in 'thee: for thou Lord hast never 'fail-ed' them that 'seek thee.
- 11 O praise the Lord which 'dwelleth in 'Sion: shew the 'people' of his 'doings.
- 12 For when he maketh inquisition for blood, he re'membereth' them : and forgetteth not the com'plaint' of the 'poor.
- 13 Have mercy upon me O Lord, consider the trouble which I suffer of 'them that' hate me: thou that liftest me up' from the 'gates of 'death.
- 14 That I may shew all thy praises within the ports of the 'daughter of 'Sion: I will re'joice in 'thy sal'vation.

- 15 The heathen are sunk down in the pit'that they' made: in the same net which they hid privily' is their' foot' taken.
- 16 The Lord is known to 'execute' judgement: the ungodly is trapped in the 'work of his 'own 'hands.
- 17 The wicked shall be turned 'into' hell: and all the people' that for-'get' God.
- 18 For the poor shall not alway be for gotten: the patient abiding of the meek shall not perish for ever.
- 19 Up Lord, and let not man have the 'upper' hand: let the heathen be 'judg-ed' in thy 'sight.
- 20 Put them in 'fear O'Lord: that the heathen may know them-'selves to 'be but' men.



PSALM 10. Ut quid, Domine?

- WHY standest thou so far'off O'Lord: and hidest thy face in the 'needful' time of 'trouble?
  - 2 The ungodly for his own lust doth' persecute the 'poor: let them be taken in the crafty wiliness' that they 'have i'magined.
  - 3 For the ungodly hath made boast of his own 'heart's de'sire: and speaketh good of the covetous 'whom 'God ab'horreth.
  - 4 The ungodly is so proud that he careth' not for 'God: neither is 'God in' all his' thoughts.
  - 5 His ways are 'alway' grievous: thy judgements are far above out of his sight, and therefore de'fieth he 'all his' enemies.
  - 6 For he hath said in his heart, Tush I shall never be 'cast' down: there shall no harm' happen' unto 'me.
  - 7 His mouth is full of cursing de'ceit and ' fraud : under his 'tongue is un'godliness and 'vanity.
  - 8 He sitteth lurking in the thievish' corners of the streets: and privily in his lurking dens doth he murder the innocent, his eyes are set a gainst the poor.



- 9 For he lieth waiting secretly, even as a lion lurketh he'in his'den: that'he may' ravish the' poor.
- 10 He doth' ravish the 'poor: when he 'getteth him' into his 'net.
- 11 He falleth down and 'humbleth him'self: that the congregation of the poor may fall 'into the 'hands of his 'captains.
- 12 He hath said in his heart, 'Tush' God hath for gotten: he hideth away his face and he will never see it.



- f 13 Arise O Lord God and lift 'up thine 'hand: for 'get' not the 'poor.
  - 14 Wherefore should the wicked blas'pheme' God: while he doth say in his heart, Tush, 'thou God' carest not' for it.
  - 15 Surely'thou hast'seen it: for thou be'holdest un'godliness and 'wrong.
  - 16 That thou mayest take the matter' into thy 'hand: the poor committeth himself unto thee, for thou art the 'helper' of the 'friendless.
  - 17 Break thou the power of the ungodly 'and ma'licious: take away his ungodliness and 'thou shalt 'find 'none.
  - 18 The Lord is King for 'ever and 'ever : and the heathen are' perished 'out of the 'land.
  - 19 Lord thou hast heard the de'sire of the 'poor: thou preparest their heart, and thine ear 'hearkeneth' there'to;
  - 20 To help the fatherless and poor 'unto their 'right: that the man of the earth be no 'more ex'alted a'gainst them.

PSALM 11. In Domino confido.



In the Lord put'I my'trust: how say ye then to my soul, that she should flee as a'bird'unto the'hill?

- 2 For lo the ungodly bend their bow, and make ready their arrow with in the 'quiver: that they may privily shoot at them' which are 'true of 'heart.
- 3 For the foundations will be 'cast' down: and 'what hath the 'righteous' done?
- 4 The Lord is in his 'holy' temple: the Lord's 'seat' is in 'heaven.
- 5 His eyes con'sider the 'poor: and his eyelids' try the 'children of' men.
- 6 The Lord al'loweth the 'righteous: but the ungodly and him that delighteth in wickedness' doth his 'soul ab'hor.
- 7 Upon the ungodly he shall rain snares, fire and brimstone'storm and 'tempest: this shall'be their'portion to'drink.
- 8 For the righteous Lord'loveth' righteousness: his countenance will be'hold the' thing that is' just.

## DAY 2. EVENING PRAYER.

PSALM 12. Salvum me fac.



HELP me Lord for there is not one godly man'left: for the faithful are minished from a'mong the children of men.

- 2 They talk of vanity every one with his neighbour: they do but flatter with their lips, and dissemble in their double heart.
- 3 The Lord shall root out all de'ceitful'lips: and the tongue that 'speaketh' proud'things;
- 4 Which have said, With our tongue will 'we pre'vail: we are they that ought to speak, 'who is' lord over 'us?


- 5 Now for the comfortless trouble's sake of the needy: and because of the deep sighing of the poor,
- 6 I will up'saith the'Lord: and will help every one from him that swelleth against him' and will'set him at'rest.
- 7 The words of the 'Lord are' pure words: even as the silver which from the earth is tried, and purified' seven times' in the 'fire.
- 8 Thou shalt 'keep them O'Lord: thou shalt preserve him from 'this gene'ration for 'ever.

2nd 9 The ungodly walk on 'every' side: when they are exalted, the chil-Part dren of 'men are' put to re'buke.

## PSALM 13. Usque quo, Domine?



- p How long wilt thou forget me O'Lord for'ever : how long wilt thou 'hide thy' face' from me?
  - 2 How long shall I seek counsel in my soul, and be so vexed in my 'heart: how long shall mine enemies triumph over me?
  - 3 Consider and hear me O'Lord my'God: lighten mine eyes that I 'sleep'not in'death.
  - 4 Lest mine enemy say, I have pre'vailed a'gainst him: for if I be cast down, they that trouble me' will re'joice' at it.
- f 5 But my trust is 'in thy 'mercy : and my heart is 'joyful in' thy. sal-'vation.
  - 6 I will sing of the Lord, because he hath dealt so'lovingly' with me: yea I will praise the' Name of the' Lord most' Highest.





THE fool hath said 'in his 'heart: There 'is 'no 'God.

- 2 They are corrupt, and become abominable 'in their 'doings: there is none that doeth 'good' no not' one.
- 3 The Lord looked down from heaven upon the 'children of 'men: to see if there were any that would understand and 'seek'after 'God.
- 4 But they are all gone out of the way, they are altogether be'come a'bominable: there is none that doeth' good' no not' one.
- [5 Their throat is an open sepulchre, with their tongues have 'they de'ceived: the poison of 'asps is 'under their 'lips.
- 6 Their mouth is full of 'cursing and' bitterness: their feet are 'swift to'shed' blood.
- 7 Destruction and unhappiness is in their ways, and the way of peace have 'they not' known: there is no fear of 'God be'fore their 'eyes.]
- 8 Have they no knowledge, that they are all such 'workers of 'mischief: eating up my people as it were bread, and 'call not up'on the 'Lord?
- 9 There were they brought in great fear, even where 'no fear' was: for God is in the gene'ration' of the 'righteous.
- 10 As for you, ye have made a mock at the counsel' of the 'poor : because he 'putteth his' trust in the 'Lord.

2nd 11 Who shall give salvation unto Israel'out of'Sion?: When the Lord turneth the captivity of his people, then shall Jacob rejoice and 'Israel' shall be' glad.

## DAY 3. MORNING PRAYER.

PSALM 15. Domine, quis habitabit?





- Lord who shall 'dwell in thy 'tabernacle: or who shall rest up'on thy 'holy 'hill?
- 2 Even he that leadeth an 'uncorrupt' life: and doeth the thing which is right, and speaketh the 'truth' from his 'heart.
- 3 He that hath used no deceit in his tongue, nor done evil'to his 'neighbour: and'hath not'slandered his'neighbour.
- 4 He that setteth not by himself, but is lowly in his 'own' eyes: and maketh much of 'them that' fear the 'Lord.
- 5 He that sweareth unto his neighbour, and disap'pointeth him'not: though it' were to his' own' hindrance.
- 6 He that hath not given his 'money upon' usury nor taken re'ward a'gainst the innocent.
- 7 Whoso doeth these 'things: shall 'never' fall.

PSALM 16. Conserva me, Domine.



PRESERVE'me O'God: for in thee 'have I'put my'trust.

- 2 O my soul thou hast said 'unto the 'Lord: Thou art my God, my goods are 'nothing' unto 'thee.
- 3 All my delight is upon the saints that are 'in the 'earth: and upon 'such as ex'cel in 'virtue.
- 4 But they that run after an'other 'god: shall 'have 'great' trouble.

- 5 Their drink-offerings of blood will 'I not' offer: neither make mention of their 'names with'in my 'lips.
- 6 The Lord himself is the portion of mine inheritance and of my 'cup: thou' shalt main'tain my'lot.
- 7 The lot is fallen unto me in a 'fair' ground: yea I 'have a 'goodly 'heritage.
- 8 I will thank the Lord for 'giving me' warning: my reins also chasten me' in the 'night'season.
- 9 I have set God'always be'fore me: for he is on my right hand 'therefore I'shall not' fall.
- 10 Wherefore my heart was glad and my'glory re'joiced: my flesh 'also shall' rest in 'hope.
- 11 For why?, thou shalt not leave my' soul in' hell: neither shalt thou suffer thy' Holy One to' see cor'ruption.
- 12 Thou shalt shew me the path of life, in thy presence is the 'fulness of 'joy: and at thy right hand there is 'pleasure for 'ever'more.

# PSALM 17. Exaudi, Domine.




HEAR the right O Lord, consider'my com'plaint: and hearken unto my prayer that goeth not'out of'feign-ed'lips.

- 2 Let my sentence come forth' from thy' presence: and let thine eyes look up'on the' thing that is' equal.
- 3 Thou hast proved and visited mine heart in the night-season, thou hast tried me and shalt find no 'wickedness' in me: for I am utterly purposed that my 'mouth shall' not of fend.
- 4 Because of men's works, that are done against the words of thy 'lips: I have kept me from the ways of the destroyer.



- ★ 5 O hold thou up my'goings'in thy'paths: 'that my'footsteps 'slip not.
  - 6 I have called upon thee O God for 'thou shalt 'hear me: incline thine ear to me and 'hearken' unto my 'words.
  - 7 Shew thy marvellous loving-kindness, thou that art the Saviour of them which put their 'trust in' thee: from such as re'sist thy 'right' hand.
  - 8 Keep me as the 'apple of an 'eye: hide me under the 'shadow 'of thy 'wings,
  - 9 From the un'godly that ' trouble me : mine enemies compass me round about to ' take a'way my ' soul.
  - 10 They are inclosed in their 'own' fat: and their mouth' speaketh 'proud' things.
  - 11 They lie waiting in our way on 'every' side: turning their' eyes 'down to the 'ground;
  - 12 Like as a lion that is 'greedy of his 'prey: and as it were a lion's whelp 'lurking in 'secret' places.
  - 13 Up Lord, disappoint him and 'cast him' down: deliver my soul from the ungodly which' is a 'sword of 'thine;
  - 14 From the men of thy hand O Lord, from the men I say and from the 'evil' world: which have their portion in this life, whose bellies thou fillest' with thy 'hid' treasure.
  - 15 They have children at 'their de'sire: and leave the rest of their 'substance' for their 'babes.
  - 16 But as for me, I will behold thy 'presence in 'righteousness: and when I awake up after thy likeness' I shall be 'satisfied' with it.



5 O hold thou up my goings'in thy' paths: that my' footsteps' slip' not.

#### DAY 3. EVENING PRAYER.

PSALM 18. Diligam tc, Domine.



- \*I WILL love thee O'Lord my'strength: the Lord is my stony'rock and 'my de'fence.
- 1a My Saviour my God and my might, in whom'I will'trust: my buckler, the horn also of my sal'vation' and my'refuge.

2nd Part

- 2 I will call upon the Lord which is 'worthy to be 'praised: so shall 'I be 'safe from mine' enemies.
- 3 The sorrows of 'death' compassed me: and the overflowings of un-'godliness' made me a'fraid.
- 4 The pains of hell'came a'bout me: the snares of'death'over'took me.
- 5 In my trouble I will call up'on the 'Lord: and com'plain' unto my 'God.
- 6 So shall he hear my voice out of his 'holy' temple: and my complaint shall come before him, it shall enter' even 'into his' ears.
- 7 The earth' trembled and 'quaked: the very foundations also of the hills shook, and were re'moved be'cause he was 'wroth.
- 8 There went a smoke out'in his' presence: and a consuming fire out of his mouth, so that' coals were 'kindled' at it.
- 9 He bowed the heavens also and 'came' down: and it was' dark 'under his' feet.
- 10 He rode upon the cherubins 'and did'fly: he came flying up'on the 'wings of the 'wind.
- 11 He made darkness his 'secret' place: his pavilion round about him, with dark water and thick' clouds to 'cover' him.
- 12 At the brightness of his presence his 'clouds re'moved: hail'stones and 'coals of 'fire.

- 13 The Lord also thundered out of heaven, and the Highest' gave his 'thunder: hail'stones and 'coals of 'fire.
- 14 He sent out his 'arrows and 'scattered them : he cast forth 'lightnings' and de'stroyed them.
- 15 The springs of waters were seen, and the foundations of the round world were discovered, at thy chiding O'Lord: at the blasting of the breath of thy displeasure.
- 16 He shall send down from on'high to'fetch me: and shall take me 'out of' many' waters.
- 17 He shall deliver me from my strongest enemy, and from 'them which 'hate me: for they 'are too 'mighty' for me.
- 18 They prevented me in the 'day of my 'trouble: but the 'Lord was 'my up'holder.
- 19 He brought me forth also into a place of liberty: he brought me forth, even because he had a favour unto me.
- 20 The Lord shall reward me after my 'righteous' dealing: according to the cleanness of my hands' shall he 'recompense' me.
- 21 Because I have kept the 'ways of the 'Lord: and have not forsaken my God'as the 'wicked' doth.
- 22 For I have an eye unto 'all his 'laws: and will not cast out 'his com-'mandments' from me.
- 23 I was also uncor'rupt be'fore him: and es'chewed mine'own 'wickedness.
- 24 Therefore shall the Lord reward me after my'righteous' dealing: and according unto the cleanness of my'hands in'his' eyesight.
- 25 With the holy'thou shalt be'holy: and with a'perfect man 'thou shalt be'perfect.
- 26 With the clean 'thou shalt be'clean: and with the 'froward 'thou shalt learn' frowardness.
- 27 For thou shalt save the people that are 'in ad'versity: and shalt bring down the 'high' looks of the 'proud.
- 28 Thou also shalt 'light my 'candle: the Lord my God shall make my 'darkness' to be 'light.

- 29 For in thee I shall discomfit an 'host of 'men: and with the help of my God I shall 'leap' over the 'wall.
- 30 The way of God is an unde'fil-ed' way: the word of the Lord also is tried in the fire, he is the defender of all them that' put their 'trust in' him.



- 31 For who is 'God: but the 'Lord: or who hath any 'strength ex-'cept our 'God?
- 32 It is God that girdeth me with 'strength of 'war: and 'maketh my 'way' perfect.
- 33 He maketh my'feet like'harts' feet: and'setteth me'up on'high.
- 34 He teacheth mine 'hands to 'fight: and mine arms shall break 'even a 'bow of 'steel.
- 35 Thou hast given me the defence of 'thy sal'vation: thy right hand also shall hold me up, and thy loving cor'rection shall make me 'great.
- 36 Thou shalt make room enough under me'for to'go: that my 'footsteps' shall not'slide.
- 37 I will follow upon mine enemies and 'over'take them: neither will I turn again ' till I 'have de'stroyed them.
- 38 I will smite them that they shall not be able to stand: but fall under my feet.
- 39 Thou hast girded me with strength 'unto the 'battle: thou shalt throw' down mine 'enemies' under me.
- 40 Thou hast made mine enemies also to turn their 'backs up'on me : and I shall de'stroy 'them that 'hate me.
- 41 They shall cry, but there shall be none to help them: yea, even unto the Lord shall they cry but he shall not hear them.
- 42 I will beat them as small as the dust be'fore the' wind: I will cast them' out as the' clay in the' streets.



- 43 Thou shalt deliver me from the 'strivings of the 'people : and thou shalt 'make me the 'head of the 'heathen.
- \* 44 A people'whom I'have'not'known: shall'serve'me.
  - 45 As soon as they hear of me'they shall o'bey me: but the strange children' shall dis'semble' with me.
  - 46 The strange 'children shall 'fail: and be a'fraid 'out of their 'prisons.



- 47 The Lord liveth, and blessed be my'strong'helper: and praised be the 'God of' my sal'vation;
- 48 Even the God that seeth that I'be a'venged: and subdueth the 'people' unto 'me.
- 49 It is he that delivereth me from my cruel enemies, and setteth me up a'bove mine' adversaries: thou shalt rid me' from the' wicked 'man.
- 50 For this cause will I give thanks unto thee O Lord a'mong the 'Gentiles: and sing' praises' unto thy' Name.

2nd 51 Great prosperity giveth he' unto his' King: and sheweth loving-Part kindness unto David his Anointed, and unto his' seed for' ever' more.

#### DAY 4. MORNING PRAYER.

#### PSALM 19. Caeli enarrant.



THE heavens declare the 'glory of 'God: and the 'firmament' sheweth his 'handy-work.

- 2 One day 'telleth an'other: and one night 'certi'fieth an'other.
- 3 There is neither'speech nor'language: but their'voices are 'heard a'mong them.
- 4 Their sound is gone out into 'all'lands: and their words' into the 'ends of the 'world.
- 5 In them hath he set a tabernacle' for the 'sun: which cometh forth as a bridegroom out of his chamber, and rejoiceth as a 'giant to 'run his' course.
- 6 It goeth forth from the uttermost part of the heaven, and runneth about unto the end of 'it a'gain: and there is nothing hid' from the 'heat there'of.



- 7 The law of the Lord is an undefiled law con'verting the 'soul: the testimony of the Lord is sure, and giveth 'wisdom' unto the 'simple.
- 8 The statutes of the Lord are right and re'joice the 'heart: the commandment of the Lord is pure, and giveth 'light' unto the 'eyes.
- 9. The fear of the Lord is clean and en'dureth for 'ever: the judgements of the Lord are true and 'righteous' alto'gether.
- 10 More to be desired are they than gold, yea than 'much fine 'gold: sweeter also than 'honey' and the 'honey-comb.



- 11 Moreover by them is thy 'servant' taught: and in keeping of them 'there is 'great re'ward.
- 12 Who can tell how oft he of fendeth: O cleanse thou me from my secret faults.
- 13 Keep thy servant also from presumptuous sins, lest they get the do'minion' over me: so shall I be undefiled and innocent' from the 'great of'fence.
- 14 Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart: be alway ac'ceptable in thy sight,
- 15 O Lord: my'strength and' my re'deemer.

PSALM 20. Exaudiat te Dominus.



THE Lord hear thee in the 'day of 'trouble: the Name of the 'God of 'Jacob de'fend thee;


- 2 Send thee help' from the 'sanctuary: and 'strengthen thee' out of 'Sion;

PSALM 21. Domine, in virtute tua.




- THE King shall rejoice in thy 'strength O'Lord: exceeding glad shall he'be of 'thy sal'vation.

#### DAY 4. EVENING PRAYER.

PSALM 22. Deus, Deus meus.



- My God, my God, look upon me, why hast' thou for'saken me: and art so far from my health, and from the' words of 'my com'plaint?
  - 2 O my God I cry in the day-time but thou hearest not: and in the night-season also I take no rest.
  - 3 And thou con'tinuest' holy: O'thou' worship of 'Israel.

- 4 Our fathers' hoped in thee: they trusted in thee and thou didst de'liver them.
- 5 They called upon thee 'and were 'holpen: they put their trust in thee 'and were 'not con'founded.
- 6 But as for me, I am a worm and 'no 'man: a very scorn of men and the 'outcast' of the 'people.
- 7 All they that see me'laugh me to'scorn: they shoot out their lips and'shake their'heads'saying,
- 8 He trusted in God that 'he would de'liver him: let him de'liver him 'if he will 'have him.
- 9 But thou art he that took me out of my'mother's' womb: thou wast my hope, when I hang-ed yet up'on my'mother's' breasts.
- 10 I have been left unto thee ever since 'I was 'born: thou art my God' even from my mother's 'womb.
- 11 O go not from me, for trouble is 'hard at 'hand: and 'there is 'none to 'help me.
- 12 Many oxen are 'come a'bout me : fat bulls of Basan close me 'in on 'every' side.
- 13 They gape upon me' with their' mouths: as it were a' ramping and a 'roaring' lion.
- 14 I am poured out like water, and all my bones are 'out of 'joint: my heart also in the midst of my body is 'even like' melting 'wax.
- 15 My strength is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue 'cleaveth to my 'gums: and thou shalt bring me'into the 'dust of 'death.
- 16 For many dogs are 'come a'bout me : and the council of the wicked 'layeth' siege a'gainst me.
- 17 They pierced my hands and my feet, I may tell 'all my 'bones: they stand 'staring and 'looking u'pon me.
- 18 They part my'garments a'mong them : and cast'lots up'on my 'vesture.
- 19 But be not thou far from 'me O'Lord: thou art my succour' haste 'thee to' help me.
- 20 Deliver my soul 'from the 'sword: my darling 'from the 'power of the 'dog.
- 21 Save me from the 'lion's 'mouth: thou hast heard me also from a'mong the 'horns of the 'unicorns.
- f 22 I will declare thy Name' unto my' brethren: in the midst of the congre'gation' will I' praise thee.



- 23 O praise the Lord'ye that' fear him: magnify him all ye of the seed of Jacob, and fear him'all ye'seed of' Israel;
- 24 For he hath not despised nor abhorred the low e'state of the 'poor: he hath not hid his face from him, but when he called 'unto' him he' heard him.
- 25 My praise is of thee in the great 'congre'gation: my vows will I perform in the 'sight of 'them that 'fear him.
- 26 The poor shall 'eat and be 'satisfied: they that seek after the Lord shall praise him, your 'heart shall 'live for 'ever.
- 27 All the ends of the world shall remember themselves, and be turned 'unto the' Lord: and all the kindreds of the 'nations shall 'worship be'fore him.
- 28 For the kingdom' is the 'Lord's: and he is the 'Governor a'mong the 'people.
- 29 All such as be'fat upon'earth: have'eaten'and'worshipped.
- 30 All they that go down into the dust shall 'kneel be'fore him: and no man hath 'quickened his' own 'soul.
- 31 My'seed shall'serve him: they shall be counted unto the 'Lord for a 'gene'ration.
- 32 They shall come, and the heavens shall de'clare his' righteousness: unto a people that shall be born' whom the 'Lord hath' made.

PSALM 23. Dominus regit me.



THE Lord'is my'shepherd: therefore'can I'lack'nothing.

2 He shall feed me in a 'green' pasture: and lead me forth be'side the 'waters of 'comfort.

- 3 He shall con'vert my' soul: and bring me forth in the paths of righteousness' for his' Name's' sake.
- 4 Yea though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will 'fear no'evil: for thou art with me, thy'rod and thy'staff 'comfort me.
  - 5 Thou shalt prepare a table before me, against' them that' trouble me: thou hast anointed my head with oil' and my' cup shall be' full.
  - f 6 But thy loving-kindness and mercy shall follow me, all the 'days of my 'life: and I will dwell in the 'house of the 'Lord for 'ever.

### DAY 5. MORNING PRAYER.

PSALM 24. Domini est terra.



- THE earth is the Lord's, and all that 'therein' is: the compass of the world and 'they that 'dwell there'in.
- 2 For he hath founded it up'on the 'seas: and pre'pared it up'on the 'floods.
- 3 Who shall ascend into the 'hill of the 'Lord: or who shall rise up 'in his 'holy 'place?
- 4 Even he that hath clean hands and a 'pure' heart: and that hath not lift up his mind unto vanity, nor'sworn to de'ceive his' neighbour.
- 5 He shall receive the blessing 'from the 'Lord: and righteousness from the 'God of 'his sal'vation.
- 6 This is the generation of 'them that' seek him: even of them that 'seek thy' face O' Jacob.





- 7 Lift up your heads O ye gates, and be ye lift up ye ever'lasting 'doors: and the King of 'glory' shall come' in.
- 8 Who is the 'King of 'glory: it is the Lord strong and mighty, even the 'Lord' mighty in 'battle.
- 9 Lift up your heads O ye gates, and be ye lift up ye ever'lasting 'doors: and the King of 'glory' shall come' in.
- 10 Who is the 'King of 'glory: even the Lord of hosts,' he is the 'King of 'glory.

## PSALM 25. Ad te, Domine, levavi.



- Unto thee O Lord will I lift up my soul, my God I have put my 'trust in 'thee: O let me not be confounded, neither let mine 'enemies 'triumph' over me.
- 2 For all they that hope in thee shall 'not be a'shamed: but such as transgress without a cause 'shall be 'put to con'fusion.
- 3 Shew me thy 'ways O'Lord: and 'teach me'thy 'paths.

- 4 Lead me forth in thy 'truth and 'learn me : for thou art the God of my salvation, in thee hath been my 'hope' all the day 'long.
- 5 Call to remembrance O Lord thy 'tender' mercies: and thy loving-kindnesses, which 'have been 'ever of 'old.
- 6 O remember not the sins and offences of my youth: but according to thy mercy, think thou upon me O'Lord' for thy goodness.
- 7 Gracious and righteous' is the 'Lord: therefore will he teach 'sinners' in the 'way.
- 8 Them that are meek shall he 'guide in 'judgement: and such as are gentle 'them shall he 'learn his 'way.
- 9 All the paths of the Lord are 'mercy and 'truth: unto such as keep his 'covenant' and his 'testimonies.
- 10 For thy Name's 'sake O'Lord: be merciful unto my'sin for 'it is 'great.
- 11 What man is he that 'feareth the' Lord: him shall he teach in the 'way that' he shall 'choose.
- 12 His soul shall 'dwell at 'ease: and his 'seed shall in'herit the 'land.
- 13 The secret of the Lord is among' them that' fear him: and' he will 'shew them his' covenant.
- 14 Mine eyes are ever looking 'unto the 'Lord: for he shall pluck my 'feet' out of the 'net.
- 15 Turn thee unto me and have 'mercy up'on me : for I am 'desolate 'and in 'misery.
- 16 The sorrows of my heart' are en'larged: O' bring thou me' out of my 'troubles.
- 17 Look upon my ad'versity and 'misery: and for give me 'all my 'sin.
- 18 Consider mine enemies how'many they'are: and they bear a 'tyrannous'hate a'gainst me.
- 19 O keep my'soul and de'liver me : let me not be confounded, for I have 'put my' trust in' thee.
- 20 Let perfectness and righteous dealing wait up on me: for my 'hope hath been in thee.
- 2nd Pt. 21 Deliver' Israel O'God: out of 'all' his' troubles.
